# VES Prepared Me Well to Pursue the Full Breadth of Stanford

At Stanford, I am a Computer Science major focusing on robotics and artificial intelligence. I also am pursuing my interest in game development.

### Learning about Artificial Intelligence

When I first arrived at Standford I joined a research team in the Stanford AI Lab (SAIL), where I worked on developing robotic vision using reinforcement learning—an AI technique—to control multi-jointed robotic arms to manipulate and assemble objects using vision.

# **Expanding on Ideas Launched at VES**

I co-lead the Stanford Robotics Club. What is particularly exciting is that we are actually working on improving the bionic exoskeleton arm I built for my Advanced Study program at VES.

Over the past two summers, I have served as an intern in the robotics industry. In my first internship, I worked on project Athena developing an autonomous indoor tour guide robot and improving its navigation capabilities using computer vision.



In my second internship, I applied deep learning—the next era of computing—where the GPU acts as the brain of computers, robots and self-driving cars that can perceive and understand the world.

### **Exploring New Opportunities**

When I first arrived, I took up archery, and served as the equipment director for Stanford Archery, a recreational club sport team that competes at state and national levels.


